Focus on the Playground

Happy Lunchtimes for all!

As governors we are often in school talking to children and staff as well as the required committee meetings. One of the things we found out while speaking to children last term was that there were some issues around lunch play.

As a result of this I would like to share with you what the school has done and what I have found out from once again talking to children, this time in the playground at lunchtime.

School has spent a considerable sum on additional training for midday supervisors, reviewed their timetable, reorganised lunchtime activities and employed the sports coaches for 2 lunch periods.

In addition to the climbing frames with their all-weather surface, the playground has been divided up into various activities which rotate around the weeks. Previously football took up a large amount of the playground. Now Prestige Sports run team games twice weekly for Key Stage 2 for those who want to join in. In the space where football used to be played were bats and balls when I was there, but I understand these change weekly. There was also a coned off area for skipping ropes, again an activity that changes. Air hockey, table football and Lego on the benches were very popular as were the traditional games which the midday supervisors are teaching the children.

Remember Grandmother's Footsteps? They report that some children are keen on the clapping games they are teaching which I certainly remember from my playground days many years ago.

Of course, in January, the grass was not suitable to play on, though the children could change into their wellies if they wanted to. When it becomes drier, reading, drawing and colouring will be available in the gazebo and there is a performance area too for budding stars!

The Lego table is the best thing!!!



It was a delight to see the children so involved and often in multi age-groups playing cooperatively. Both the midday supervisors and the children I spoke to like the new arrangements better. Well done, Miss Wass and her staff for being creative in the way they now use the space for the benefit of the children.
